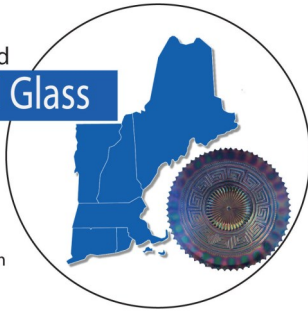

WOW! What a monumental convention this year. As I mingled with fellow members, everyone I overheard was saying what a great time they were having, what a great location and how friendly and accommodating the hotel staff was. It was apparent that everyone was relaxed and excited to be socializing with friends they hadn't seen since last year or longer due to the pandemic.

The convention unofficially started Wednesday afternoon as some long distance travelers came from Missouri, Michigan, Ontario, Ohio, and South Carolina. These early birds met up with some of the more local New England attendees and walked across the parking lot from the hotel to Chili's for dinner.



Thursday, more and more travelers arrived to start the convention. Welcome packets were distributed with a warm welcome from President, Steve Lindquist. Many noted how their packet contained a personalized note addressed to them. There were vibrant visuals in the



passageways to show that the next several days were focused on Carnival Glass and NECGA, I must

say that they were most impressive. Most of the afternoon was meeting up with friends and get acclimated to the hotel. As people were gathering, the Nutmeg Ballroom was set-up for the 3pm mini-auction of Stretch Glass and Contemporary Carnival glass, as well as the "Belle of the Ballroom" - the breath-taking collection of Mavis and the late George Loescher.

After the mini-auction, at 6:30pm, there was a pizza party in the Promenade Room where 15 pizzas of 8 varieties were served with salad, beverages and desserts.

Following the pizza party, convention attendees moved back into the ballroom for video presentation.

This video was surreal, as it was a presentation by Mavis and George Loescher recorded in 2003 at the HOACGA convention. George shared entertaining stories on 15 pieces of glass from their collection as

Mavis held them to show those at the presentation. What was unique and special about this NECGA presentation, put together by Gary Sullivan and Steve Lindquist, was that as the video played 13 of those 15 pieces were on display next to the screen and Gary held them up—being Mavis. After the presentation, the crowd was able to start previewing the Carnival Glass being auctioned off on Saturday.



One of the highlights of the hotel was the Outdoor Experience area which was the "Courtyard" - a garden patio enclosure, with a fire pit. As many convention goers sat around the glowing firepit enjoying the fresh air and moonlit night sky—stories and laughs were flowing. You could just tell everyone was relaxed enjoying themselves and their company.



Friday morning the convention group were invited to the home of Gary and Steve for an Open House. viewing their collection of Carnival Glass that was in 5 rooms/areas of their home. What a special treat this was.

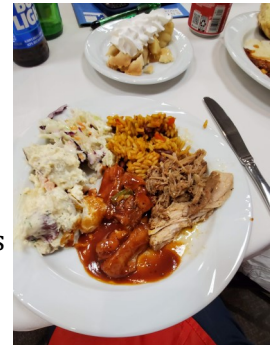
Returning back to the hotel for 1:30pm, the next seminar on the agenda began. Dave Noyes and Sue Menard provided a presentation titled, "Things that you don't see often." Dave showed pieces of glass that were whimsical or shaped differently as well as unusual

colors. It was most interesting.

After this presentation, a club meeting was conducted with it's members. As this roving reporter was not a member, I sat silently listened in. Elections were held for the officers and 2 board of directors with Steve Lindquist returning as President, Gary Sullivan-Treasurer, Kris Dorais -Secretary and newly elected Vice President Dave Noyes. Board of Directors elected were Don Dorais, Chase Marquis and Norm Spicher. The club had a discussion about the future of the Spring Fling, whether it should continue or evolve into a regular club meeting. President Steve opened the floor up to the club looking for feedback on the new hotel to decide a return for the following year. The club was very pleased with the hotel and area amenities and overwhelmingly approved.

The day continued with a banquet dinner, banquet presentation, and the club fundraiser mini-auction. After our bellies were full, attention was directed to Doug, Sue, and Dustin Siska as they presented to the room “Shades of Carnival.” They displayed 30+ pieces of Carnival Glass in several patterns showcasing how base colors and/or iridescence vary. It was quite educational and entertaining with everyone enjoying the presentation.



Rounding off the evening was the club’s fundraiser—the mini-auction. Items auctioned were maple syrup and maple confections, assorted carnival glass, brownies, tools, fall decorations, wine... and more. This fun-filled auction supplied laughs and the proceeds help with future club activities.

The culmination of the convention was Saturday’s auction of the astounding collection of Mavis and the late George Loescher. The Matthew Wroda Auction Service team (Matthew, Jim, Laurie, Monica and Randy) organized and executed an extremely professional auction.



Before the auction began, the awards for top two room displays were presented. A room display is a creative way to display one’s carnival glass to a self creative theme. First place went to Joanne Andrews for her swans in a universal of colors, and Seconds place went to Doug and Sue Siska for their “Carnival Glass in Mirrored Still Life.”

A good-sized crowd attended from early preview to the conclusion around 3pm. Much excitement filled the ballroom during bids and winnings. The adage of “there are no friends at an auction” was apparent, however friendships trumped some sales. During the auction, NECGA supplied a lunch with wraps, subs, assorted salads, and beverages.



In my honest opinion, the 2022 NECGA Convention was a huge success. As I was leaving I couldn’t help to overhear so many comments and compliments of all of the activities, hospitality and easy accessibility to the hotel. Clearly NECGA knocked it out of the park.

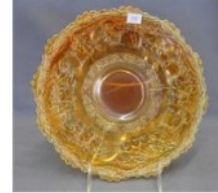

There was interest in the breakfast casserole and blueberry buckle at Steve and Gary's Open house during the convention —and they generously provided. Steve noted that once again he burned the bottom of the buckle and apologizes and wishes you better luck. He thanks those that didn't say anything and kindly threw the burned portion away.

Breakfast Casserole

*You can make this ahead of time—so it's the perfect breakfast casserole for Christmas morning or any day!

Ingredients:

2 pounds pork sausage
12 eggs
1 cup sour cream
¼ cup milk
salt and pepper
4 green onions (scallions)
½ green pepper, diced
½ red, yellow or orange bell pepper, diced
1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
1 cup shredded mozzarella cheese

Instructions:

1. Preheat oven to 350° F. Butter or use cooking spray a 9x13" pan
2. Combine the eggs, sour cream, milk, cheeses and salt and pepper in a large bowl. Mix on low speed with electric mixer, just until combined
3. Heat a large skillet over medium heat. Add sausage and cook until browned, breaking it into small pieces with a wooden spoon as it cooks. Drain most of the grease and add the sausage to the bowl with the egg mixture.
4. Add the bell peppers and onion to the same skillet the sausage was cooked in and sauté for 2-3 minutes. Add to the bowl with the eggs and stir everything to combine
5. Pour mixer into the greased 9 x 13" pan and back 35-50 minutes or until the edges are set and the center is just barely jiggly
6. Leftover egg casserole can be stored in the fridge and enjoyed within 3-4 days. Leftover are delicious reheated in the microwave,

Blueberry Buckle

*from the Favorite Blueberry Recipes Cookbook collected by The Cromwell Historical Society—Revised Edition 1977

Ingredients:

½ cup shortening
½ cup sugar
1 egg beaten
2 cup sifted flour
½ tsp salt
2 ½ teaspoons baking powder
½ cup milk

Crumb topping:

½ cup sugar
½ cup flour
¼ tsp cinnamon
1/3 cup butter, softened

2 ½ cups blueberries

Instructions:

1. Preheat oven to 375° F. Butter or use cooking spray a 8" square pan
2. Cream shortening and sugar. Add beaten eggs.
3. Mix and sift dry ingredients and add to the creamed mixture alternately with milk.
4. Spread the dough in 8" square pan and then spread blueberries on top of dough
5. Mix and sift dry crumb topping ingredients together, then cut in softened butter. Spread over blueberries,
6. Bake 1 to 1 1/4 hours at 375° F. Serve warm as coffee cake or dessert,
