It comes in smoke, pastel marigold, clambroth, marigold and has been reported in green. It is mostly seen in the vase shape, but they are scarce to find. I loved it!

Donnie had made some shrimp Mozambique (appetizer) and smoked some pulled pork for dinner. The Lucariello's joined us along with Randy and Monica. Well, he found out that it was a variant and somewhat rare due to: 1) it was flared with a sawtooth edge; 2) it had great green blueish even iridescence; and 3) it had the daisy design within the central band rather than the alternating basketweave and floral theme, 4) it has the orange tree pattern on the back AND the front. I talked with some carnival experts (I simply am not) and they explained to me that the plates have 4 orange trees in the pattern and the fruit bowls have 3 orange trees. I never knew that! Svea Rosebowls by Eda Glassworks, Varmland Sweden



The following was taken from the Eda tourism website: Eda Glass Museum can be found in Eda Folkets Park near the border with Norway. The museum displays a selection of glass from Eda glassworks' production.

The mill was active between 1835 and 1953 and around the turn of the century 1900 one of Sweden's largest glassworks with about 300 employees. Household glass was mainly produced here and in the museum's large hall, e.g. ground, engraved, painted and engraved glass, luster, uranium and other press glass, designer Gerda Strömberg's beautiful art deco glass, unique grave balls etc.

Luster glass mentioned above refers to carnival glass. We started to collect Svea rosebowls when we saw one at an ACGA convention and it spoke to Steve's Swedish heritage. We have since accumulated the five rosebowls above. They are 3 ½, 4 ½, 5 ½, 6 ½ and 7 ½ inches across at the widest part of the bowl. We have found them in marigold, a light blue, shades of amethyst and an iridized milk glass. Above are both blue and amethyst rosebowls. The iridescence makes it hard to see the difference in these two colors. Hooked on Carnival lists over 30 different Eda carnival patterns . The Svea pattern has other shapes besides rosebowls but we are happy with our small Swedish collection.




Convention 2023



Chatelaine - A Fantastic Tumbler

For sheer beauty in shape, design, color and iridescence, the "Chatelaine" tumbler rates very high on any tumbler collectors list. Mr. Richard Owens, in his fine carnival glass tumbler book, rates this tumbler as one of the top ten tumblers in the field. I would probably not crowd it into my top ten favorite tumblers, but I believe I could find room for it in my top twenty.

"Chatelaine" is considered an Imperial tumbler. The outstanding deep purple color and super iridescence are characteristics in which Imperial is so well noted. The "Chatelaine" pattern has been reported only in the purple color. I have dreamed of finding one of these little gems in marigold, but so far my dream has never came true. Most tumbler collections contain one of these in purple, and one will come up for sale occasionally. Even so, this tumbler in perfect condition, will usually demand a price of about three hundred and fifty dollars.

"Chatelaine" tumblers are slightly taller than most of our carnival glass tumblers. They have a ground base which was done at the factory in order to make them set level on the table. The water pitcher in this pattern show is equally beautiful and most desirable. Only seldom will one of these pitchers show up for sale.

Update:

Chatelaine is shwn as mold #407 in the 1909 Imperial catalog. HookedonCarnival shows 27 undamaged Chatelaine tumblers selling over the last 11 years with an average price of about \$220 and 7 undamaged water pitchers selling for an average of about \$1,500. The only color listed is purple.








