# **Recording Secretary Report**

## Notes from the Sunday, October 15th meeting.

Present at the meeting: David & Sue, Gary & Steve, Kris & Don, Harold & Lynne, Vickie & John, Norm, and Paul & Yvette. Show & Tell took place and the meeting began at 11:10 a.m.

## **Old Business:**

- Last Club Meeting Minutes/Report: Norm made a motion, seconded by Dave. All were in favor.
- Treasury Report: Not much change in the treasury. Recent new members, and membership renewals. Dave made a motion to accept the treasury report and it was seconded by Norm. All were in favor.

## **Unfinished Business:**

• Facebook Group was created by Steve to replace the Facebook page. Easier to maintain and promote. Old page will be removed at end of October. Gained a new club member from FB.

## **New Business:**

- Tentative 2024 dates discussed. April 21, June 9, August 11, October 6, and December 8. Dave Noyes will check with American Legion to ensure dates are available with them.
- 2024 Spring Fling? The club decided not to have our "weekend" away and opted to attend the Keystone Club's convention. Club members who opt to attend will meet up with other NECGA members. This worked out well for 2023.
- Bulletin costs: Steve has done the printing and mailing of the bulletin for the first time. He stated that he went to FedexOffice and it would have cost \$289 to print in color. He then got a quote from Minuteman Press for \$137 plus tax. The quote was based on 14 pages, double-sided, full color, 30 copies. Roughly it costs \$6 per copy printed. Recently the US Postal Service increased the rates to mail out large envelopes. It now costs \$1.90 per copy sent in the US and \$3.90 to Canada. Steve reminded the club that there is no cost associated with bulletins being emailed. Altogether, printing, envelopes and postage add up to \$8 per copy—5 copies per year—for a grand total of \$40 per member a year. After thorough discussion a motion was made by Dave, seconded by Gary, to increase dues for hard copy from \$18/yr to \$25/yr. All were in favor. Starting January 1, 2024.
- Convention Feedback: Meals were good. Hotel chef can create new buffet dinners at same price point instead of only having 2 options to choose from. Rooms were scattered about. The auction lunch wraps were not made per the order placed. The large subs were too much bread. A decision was made to provide all wraps for 2024 along with chips, side salad, and cookies.
- Dave made a motion to close the business meeting, seconded by Lynne. All were in favor.

Our Meeting adjourned at 11:55.












NW Grape and Cable plate in pumpkin marigold



Fenton Stretch Glass Laurel Leaf large underplate in Tangerine. Now to find the matching bowl.



# Four Flowers and Four Flowers Variant by Steve Lindquist

The Four Flowers pattern, made by Dugan, consists of four large flowers separated by overlapping crescent shapes. The exterior side may be plain or soda gold. Colors found are Peach Opal, Amethyst/Purple, Marigold, and Powder Blue with Marigold overlay. A rose bowl made from a chop plate was sold in 2020 in Lime Green with Marigold overlay. Shapes can be found in chop plates (11"), plates (6"), small bowls (5-6"), and large bowls (9-10"). Edge treatments on bowls are ruffled, flared, 2-side up, ICS, and tri-cornered.



The Four Flowers Variant pattern is the same in broad concept as Dugan's Four Flowers, but it has the addition of a long stemmed buds between the four sets of crescent shaped claws in the design. On the back, it may have a thumbprint pattern or it may be plain and there is a many rayed star in the very center of the base. Four Flowers Variant was made using a one piece mould, and therefore they have no mould seams. It has a ground base, often with a number of tiny chips, and frequently the glass is full of air bubbles or even streaks of pigment. The edge is scalloped.

The most frequently found shapes in the Four Flowers Variant design are the 8" to 9" inch bowls and plates. There are scarce examples that are both bigger and

smaller. Large 10" bowls and 11" chop plates and can be found in green and purple. There is a medium size version of this pattern by Brockwitz (approximately 7-7 1/2 inches) that does NOT have the four flower buds between the crescent shapes but it will come with the thumbprint back.

The Variant is found in varieties of green base glass, ranging from icy green, teals and aquas,



through to apple green, emerald and dark olive. There is amber, pale yellow, and purple of every shade to lighter shades of amethyst. And there's an odd shade light green.

It is believed that the maker of the Four Flowers Variant was Brockwitz in Germany, probably from as early as 1905 or 1906.

There is also a Scandinavian version of the Four Flowers pattern. It was made by both Eda Glasbruk in Sweden and by Riihimäki in Finland, predominantly in the bowl form but also in a very scarce plate shape. The colors are marigold, blue and rare shades of pale lilac and green. The Scandinavian version of the Four Flowers pattern looks exactly like the Dugan version, so it does not have the long stemmed bud between the four sets of claws. It could possibly have been made using the Dugan mould, but this has not been proven. The Scandinavian Four Flowers version has a ground base. The Dugan version does not. They tend to be very radium and when ruffled, they tend to have 10 ruffles. Also the crescents are thinner and do not reach to the edge.





