Notes from the Sunday, August 11th meeting.

Present at the meeting: Gary & Steve, Kris & Don, Dave & Sue, Val & Jim, Norm, Ben, and Kathy & Tim Show & Tell took place and the meeting began at 11:07 a.m.

Old Business:

- Correction to bulletin: reflected \$7 error regarding club subsidy for banquet dinner. Should have been \$9. Motion by Jim to approve, Gary seconded it—all approved (59 banquet meals)
- Treasury Report: Norm made a motion to approve and Dave seconded it. All in favor.

Unfinished Business:

- BOD asked for in person meeting during convention to discuss 2025 convention. President Steve outreached to hotel to make sure 2025 dates were available. New Sales Mgr at hotel reviewed 2024 room reservations and also what club does and provided a better rate than originally quoted. Steve contacted BOD with new information and BOD approved to go ahead with contract and deposit. Original quote was \$2475 to rent ballroom 3 days, \$2000 F/B minimum and \$125 guest room rate. New quote \$1800 to rent ballroom 3 days, \$1400 F/B minimum and \$125 guest room rate. Steve cancelled BOD scheduled meeting.
- Convention 2024: Steve reported that there was no price increase for this year's banquet meals. The club agreed to a \$7 per person subsidy. Members must register before August 11 to the banquet meal discount. The club must meet the \$2200 food minimum. The Saturday lunch during the auction will be assorted wraps with side salads.

New Business:

- Convention 2024: To date Steve reported the hotel had received 30 reservations equating to 79 room nights.
- News Bulletin: lost 5 households during renewals. Now mail out 18 hard copies. USPS prices increased. Mailing in US costs \$1.77 per copy and \$3.55 to Canada based on weight of a 12 page bulletin, which costs approx. \$4.95 a printed copy. It is estimated there is a \$8.65 loss per year per person.
- End of Term: At the convention there will be nominations needed for all officers (President, Vice President, Treasurer and Secretary. Also nominations for 3 Board of Directors.
- Robin Brown has volunteered to make the club fundraiser 50-50 board.
- Val made a motion to close the business meeting, seconded by Gary. All were in favor.
- Our meeting adjourned at 11:30

Convention 2024 Highlights



The NECGA 2024 Convention officially began on Wednesday at the Courtyard by Marriott in Cromwell, CT. The hotel was staged with welcoming signs and reception items just waiting for guests to arrive. While that was taking place Matthew Wroda Auctions set up over 630 lots of glass that were sold either Friday afternoon or Saturday. Friday's auction was believed to be the first auction of only International CG. That night, 12 early birds for the convention met in the lobby and then walked next door to Chili's to have dinner. There was fun conversation, laughs and then some trivia quizzes came about.



The first activity on the schedule was something new. The Great NECGA Spelling Bee organized and run by the Matthew Wroda Auction team. Following some rules of the Scripps National Spelling Bee, attendees were given words in the Carnival Glass realm to spell, like colors, patterns, makers, etc. There were 15 willing spellers at the start and finishing with First (Vernette Shaffer), Second (Maxine Burkhardt) and Third (Sue Siska) places. Honestly, everyone had a lot of fun.





Following the game was the clubs sponsored pizza party, and then capping off the days activities was an Educational Seminar by Gary Sullivan and Dave Noyes on International Carnival Glass manufacturers. As Fridays auction focuses on non-USA made Carnival Glass, Gary and Dave gave oversight on where several manufacturers were located using maps and using glass from the auction to showcase examples of the manufacturers glass. The presentation focused on the 7 continents, although there were no companies located in Antarctica or Africa. It



was an enlightening presentation.

Afterwards, many went out to the center courtyard of the hotel to sit around the fire pit to kickback and relax

At noon, Friday, the first auction began with the sale of 267 lots of Internationally made Carnival Glass. It was an eye opening experience to see what this glass sold for and how much was actually sold to the floor. There is new potential and interest in this glass. Following the auction, everyone had a little break to relax and get ready for the banquet













After the banquet meal, everyone moved to the presentation area for Christina Katsikas' talk on her Acorn Burrs punch sets, several pieces of her amazing aqua opal, and Pulled Husk Corn vases. Everyone was so captivated by the sheer

beauty of her glass. So many pieces that you had never seen before. Christina also spoke of her research to the Acorn Burrs pattern. If you examined this pattern it really has no similarity to acorns. What the pattern really is similar to is Buckeye that was prevalent in Ohio - where the Northwood manufacturer was located. Perhaps the maker of the mould came from Ohio and it was a nod to the plant? Ending the night was the club's mini-auction fundraiser which was very successful.







Saturday was auction day. The turn-out for the auction was great with such beautiful glass to be had. What more can you say about an auction?? Well, after the auction there was so much interest in International Carnival Glass that next year will be another auction with it on Friday. For those that were staying one more night at the hotel, the survivors dined across the street at Cafe Fiore for some insanely delicious Italian meals.
